

## Facilitator Notes for Principle 9: Appropriate and Responsible Use of Technology

The facilitator notes include discussion points for scenarios that raise awareness and increase understanding of *Principle 9* of the *Licensure Code of Professional Conduct*. Please reference the <u>Facilitator Instructions</u> to help you prepare professional development using these scenarios.

Scenario 1		
A classroom teacher is using a short YouTube video as an introduction to a new topic		
in class. When the video is over, the next recommended video begins to play. It contains inappropriate language.		
Area of Concern	In this scenario, the educator violated Principle 9d for	
Under Principle 9	presenting inappropriate, non-school-related media to students.	
Primary Users	All licensed educators	
Key Considerations	<ul> <li>The teacher must be fully aware of the content he or she is presenting and the technology being used.</li> </ul>	
Strategies to	When using YouTube or other technology tools to present	
Mitigate Risk	educational content, investigate how to use that platform without the risk of exposing students to inappropriate content.	
	<ul> <li>Turn off autoplay on YouTube and use a professional or school account. This will ensure the viewing history is not affected by personal viewing history.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Always carefully check and test media and any resources (such as links, files, etc.) before sharing it with students.</li> </ul>

## Scenario 2

A teacher wants students to take an online, interactive quiz during class, but one student forgot to bring a device. The teacher gives the student her unlocked cell phone so the student can participate. While using the cell phone, the student sees several revealing photos.

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Area of Concern Under Principle 9	<ul> <li>This scenario causes concern under Principle 9b, which states that educators should prevent students from using educators' personal devices to access inappropriate material.</li> <li>There are also concerns under Principle 9h for using technology to distribute improper material that could be accessed by students.</li> </ul>
Primary Users	All licensed educators
Key Considerations	<ul> <li>Although the teacher's intent is positive, there is always a risk when giving students access to personal devices.</li> </ul>
Strategies to Mitigate Risk	<ul> <li>Be extremely careful in sharing personal electronic devices with students, especially cell phones.</li> <li>Have students share devices or have students use a shared device owned by the school.</li> <li>Analyze the risks compared to the rewards. In this scenario, is your interactive quiz worth the risk?</li> </ul>

## Scenario 3

A teacher develops an innovative and engaging lesson that effectively helps students learn a critical concept. The teacher uses her school computer to create an account on an online marketplace and sell this lesson to other educators.

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Area of Concern Under Principle 9	<ul> <li>In this scenario, the educator is violating Principle 9i by using school-owned technology to run, manage, and or promote a personal business venture.</li> </ul>	
Primary Users	All licensed educators	
Key Considerations	<ul> <li>The lesson was created and sold while an employee of the school system using district resources.</li> <li>Consider the educator's contract and/or collective bargaining agreement. The educator could be violating the contract if lessons are considered to be the intellectual property of the district.</li> </ul>	
Strategies to Mitigate Risk	<ul> <li>Follow your local board policy and make sure to understand your contract and/or collective bargaining agreement.</li> <li>Be careful not to use the technology owned by your school system for personal business ventures.</li> </ul>
